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News of the Groves

News from Carleton College Grove (Minnesota) Relayed by John the Verbose

Four new Druids of the Third Order! The tradition of Reformed Druidism has been strong and inspiring under the leadership of AD Austin. Since his rise to the seat of power in the RDNA, there had been occasional collaboration between Carleton Grove and Oakdale Grove. This ranged from mentorship, to round table meetings with both the Arch-Druid and college Chaplain, to ritual collaborations at large events such as the 60th anniversary Samhain and Oimelc rituals. The latter of which actually took the place of Carleton College's annual Candlemas service *in* the chapel sanctuary (see the *C.O.R.D. 4.4* volume/issue for details of that occasion).





Arch-Druid Austin and three other members of the Grove had graduated earlier this month, but the Grove is still in good hands, as a new Arch-Druid has been selected in accordance with the Carleton Grove Constitution. Edward Wellspring, a Third Order and Carleton Grove Alumnus, assisted Austin in overseeing the Vigilers, and ensuring the experience was meaningful and introspective for each candidate. Oakdale Grove provided the ordination certificates, ribbons, Druid Sigil pendants and legal documents so that the new ordainees can register as clergy with the state.

There has also been a bit of an informational revelation that there is a tendency for some Carleton Grove Druids to view Third Order Ordination as a kind of "graduation" *out of* Druidry that mirrors their graduation out of college. Perhaps this notion should inspire existing Third Order Druids to place emphasis on the notion that the Third Order rite of passage is what inaugurates the individual into a lifetime of service to the Earth-Mother and to her followers, rather than a culminating means to an end.



News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

In early June, six members of Oakdale Grove met to review our various versions of our Black Book of Liturgy. Aside from the formatting and typographic updates between our first, second, and third editions, the most glaring current issue is that some members' copies of the third edition are somehow different from each other. Thus we met to read through the scripts and compare it against the

source file. We quickly determined that the third edition source file was updated a second time, but was not exported to PDF a second time. The other likely factor is there was probably a redundant PDF file, and the one that hadn't been updated accidentally got uploaded to Lulu Press instead. Now that we figured out what the problem is, we made a few tweaks based on recommendations of the members present, and created a 4th edition.

The most anticipated event of the year though was this weekend. In the 93°F (34°C) heat and

humidity, we had 40 attendees at the Midsummer Solstice Reunion at Carleton College yesterday! The ceremony was led by Edward Wellspring who encouraged and successfully got a good amount of attendee participation in the bardic offerings section. The winds were strong with a good omen, and many Waters were poured from the pitchers. We even had about half a dozen new initiates to the First Order! We did decide to cancel our group pilgrimage to the sacred sites in the Arboretum because of how oppressively hot it was.





The next order of the day was to find an air conditioned environment for a late lunch and hydration in advance of Jax K's All Night Vigil. From lunch through dinner, we moved between different air conditioned places to rest. We enjoyed the ice-cold air conditioned space of the chapel, aided by the thick stone walls where it was a relief to lean against as it wicked heat away. A half hour before sunset, we ventured back out into the heat to return to the Arboretum and remained there until dawn.

Winds picked up overnight, keeping mosquitoes away. Fireflies danced and darted around us in the dark, blinking with their magical sciences and chemistries. The temperature came down to 78°F (25°C) by dawn, and the wind felt so much cooler for once, though more humid. All went well, and Jax K. was ordained as a Third Order Druid with very responsive winds, and there was much rejoicing; congratulations, Jax!

Season of the Mother Grove: Spring 2025 by Edward Wellspring

Spring of Dewy Dawns

Spring entered roaring like a dragon at war, warmth stirring breezes rich with the scent of fertile earth. Winter's harsh changes responded with a last surge of snow, a spell of frosting fit to every surface and limb. Notus supplied a blast of heat to strip the trees and inspired subtle signs of leaves too soon. Boreas submitted biting winds that wailed and chilled, and frost barred the blades of grass from growing. The last shaded spots of snow survived a month, washed into forgotten vestiges by weeks of light and listless drizzle.

Mild grey mornings tempted the Earth to rise from sleep, each moist measure exposed on the grass. Through weeks of rain and cloudy cloak, a sly sun sometimes teased ready buds. Farmers had to resist many muddy opportunities to plow and plant, for no window merited action. LITHA – Summer Solstice

Welcome to LITHA and our new season of Summer! This is the season of time outdoors, and watching things grow. It's so grounding to spend solid time outside enjoying nature (it's also great for your mental health!) as well as the many fresh fruits and produce on offer. Below find a few ideas on how to celebrate the season throughout summer months:

Make Fresh Fruit Popsicles

All you need is a bit of produce and a blender and voila! You can use purchased popsicle molds or make them in something as simple as a paper cup or recycled yogurt container.

Here is a recipe I made up this week to share with you (they were yum!)

- 1 banana
- 2 oranges (peeled)
- ½ c of pineapple
- 1/2 c of plain greek yogurt
- 2T honey
- Blend pour in molds, freeze and enjoy!

<u>Note:</u> If you don't have molds and are using recycled containers or paper cups, Part way through your freeze (wait about 2.5 hours) insert a wood tongue depressor into each and then continue freezing.



Reader-submitted divinations, premonitions, soothsaying, prophesies, omens, etc.


Submission by John the Verbose Methodology: Tarot of Druids

About this deck

This isn't your typical Tarot deck, as the major and minor arcana are different, and you need to keep them as separate stacks. Cards 1 & 2 at the left and right are always from the major arcana deck, and the five cards in the middle need to be from the minor arcana deck. Cards on the left of the minor arcana are of lesser influence, the minor on the right have a stronger influence.

- 1. Mood: Dagda In need of protection
- 2. Your Influences: Cu Cuchulain Superstition

External Influences:

- 3. Nine of Chalices Material satisfaction
- 4. Four of Mistletoe Unexpected opportunities
- 5. Six of Chalices Old scores to be settled
- 6. Knight of Swords Fierce struggle or an arrogant person
- 7. Queen of Anguinum Envy, suspicion, and greed

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of Druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, but here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listing</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2024, the 62nd Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began on the first day of Samradh, which is one day after the 90th day of Earrach. It simply counts the days of each season as well.

• <u>RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet</u> can be a helpful tool.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

We've created a <u>free training program</u> for the RDNA, and for those who complete the program, an honor society within the RDNA called the *Order of Bradán Feasa* (pronounced *bra-DON FOSS-ah*), named after the Salmon of Knowledge in Irish mythology.

Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus it was difficult to communicate with the Council at the time), but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects Druids around the world.


Meet the Editor

We have a <u>convenient form</u> that allows Gmail users to enter text-based contribs as well as attach files or photos! A Google account is only required for sending attachments through the form.


Non-Gmail Users Have Two Ways to Contribute
